Nerang River Summer Whiting

Wow! A free day! So, on the spur of the moment your Editor decided to go fishing (a rare event lately). It was Wednesday 8 March, a couple of days after our March club meeting – the date will become significant in a moment.

Before I joined the Southern Brisbane Sportfishing Club I MAY have just 'gone fishing'. But not these days. Now I had to decide which species to target, and then where to go.

The forecast was for showers and windy, so The Pin area was out for my little boat. We'd had quite good rain in recent days, so the local rivers were even muddier than usual – scratch the Albert, Coomera and Pimpama Rivers.

The Nerang River would be a BIT muddy, but nowhere near as bad as these three, so chasing **Summer Whiting** in the Nerang River became my choice. I have caught some very nice Summer Whiting in the Nerang over the years, and they are good little fighters on light tackle. Good eating, too.

A spot that has been kind to me a few times in the past is the area at the southern end of Little Tallebudgera Creek, where it broadens out at the back of the new Gold Coast Convention Centre. Good for Bream and Whiting. So I decided to go there – out of the wind.

My late decision to go fishing meant I had missed the dawn period, but no worries – Summer Whiting seem to feed through the middle of the day. I had some 'good old standby' bait in the freezer – salted chicken breasts, and bulk frozen shelled prawns from Coles – so I decided not to waste time buying or catching bait. I could only spare a few hours.

However, just in case the Summer Whiting weren't on the bite – they've been a bit scarce this summer – I decided to make up a brew of **burley** to try to get some of the Bream under the jetties and pontoons excited. Multi-grain breadcrumbs, **tiny** pieces of chicken breast, and some Weet Bix crumbs, all mixed thoroughly into damp sand at the boat ramp - that should do the trick!

I launched the boat about lunch time from the little boat ramp on the Isle of Capri. Having seen some quite reasonable Bream caught off the bank there, I decided to have a try under an adjacent jetty pontoon, just a few boat lengths from the boat ramp, before heading off to my intended Whiting spot.

I used my well documented Jetty Bream technique, described in detail in the June 2005 Newsletter article entitled: *Fishing an Intelligence Test*, which can be accessed in the Members Only section of our web site by members who have joined since then. To make it even more effective, I used a 'Reefa' hook, named in deference to Reefa Rawlins. He introduced me to the idea of using small long shanked hooks for just about all fishing (Mustad Size 6 Bloodworm hooks, for the purists among us).

I started fishing about 1pm. Tossed in a couple of scoops of burley, waited a few minutes, another

scoop of burley, and then I dropped a tiny, unweighted chicken bait in amongst the sinking burley. Lots of slack line, so the only way I could tell if there was a fish taking my bait was to watch for slack line suddenly being taken up.

I missed the first run, and lost the bait – but second bait, and there was a 'keeper' Bream in my creel. Must have taken me all of ten minutes to catch my first fish!

However, several scoops of burley and lost little chicken baits later I still had only one fish. Typical! One bloody Bream per jetty – they are HIGHLY educated in the Nerang River, I can tell you. So, off to my Whiting spot I went.

But wait – there is that other old jetty and rock wall I've caught fish off in the past. I'll just give the Burley 'n Bait routine another quick run over there.

Less than an hour later my tally was five Bream – sadly, three were just below legal size (22cm), but at least I had dinner for two in the creel. And, amazingly, four of those Bream were caught without moving the boat.

I felt like a real smart arse. At last, I've worked out a way to fool these Jetty Bream into continuing to take baits after other fish have been caught under their noses. Bloody brilliant! What a pity they don't just grow a bit faster!

I ran out of burley then, so the fish went right off the bite, and so again I headed for my proven Whiting spot.

Waste of fuel – not a single fish from this spot, so I called it a day with just two 'keeper' Bream.

The following Wednesday evening I noticed there was a full moon, and Thursday 16 March presented another clear day for me. This time I climbed out of bed at 4am and got on the water nice and early. I had checked FishCal on the SBSFC web site Wednesday evening – more on that later – and it said Thursday 16 March was a 'Good' day (not a 'Best' day – that was the day before, of course): "Best times 01:10am/01:35pm; Minor times 07:23am/07:48pm)." So I was all set and fishing at the 07:23am 'Minor' feeding time. And guess what? The Jetty Bream were really on the chew!

To cut a long story short, I fished all morning around several of my favourite Nerang River jetties, all near the northern end of Little Tallebudgera Creek, and I had caught 8 Bream by lunch time – and the 'Best' fishing time was yet to come! However, 5 of the 8 were 22 cms long – have the Bream in the Nerang River been genetically engineered to stop growing at 22cm? Another two were 23cm, but I'm afraid a 23cm Bream just looks too small for me to keep – I think NSW has it right, setting a legal minimum for Bream at 25cm. So out of eight fish, I had only one 'keeper', at 25cm.

I had run out of burley at one stage, and hence stopped catching Bream – so I found a bit of sandy riverbank and made up another small bucket full.

The Bream were biting all morning that day. Late morning I anchored under the road bridge over Little Tallebudgera Creek, simply to get out of the blazing sun, and the Bream were biting there too – but I couldn't boat one to save my life. I was fishing with 5lb breaking strain line until a very nice size Bream busted me off under one of the jetties earlier on. At that stage I decided giving the fish a fighting chance wasn't such a great idea – especially when decent fish were proving so difficult to come by.

Under the bridge I was fishing with a clear mono line which had a 15lb breaking strain, but it felt like much lighter line because it was unusually thin. I must have had at least five decent Bream on that line under that bridge – each one for about one second. They weren't breaking the line – I had the drag set ridiculously light – so I can only assume I was hooking them right on the bottom and they were dragging my line straight across an oyster rock. There were plenty of oyster rocks there on the bottom for them to choose from.

I even tried fishing the bottom with a 25lb line and a 40lb leader – bigger hook and bait – but they were too smart to take that!

So here's the tally: almost lunch time, stinking hot, 8 Bream caught but only one 25cm long kept. Can you believe it? I looked like going home with less fish than the previous Wednesday, which FishCal said was only a 'Fair' day.

Hot and desperate, I took my remaining few scoops of burley back to one of the previously productive

pontoons. I anchored slightly upstream of it – by this time the Nerang River was running out at a serious rate of knots, as it does – and I started Burleying and Baiting in under the boats moored at the pontoon jetty. **Bang! Bang! Bang!** Three 'keeper' Bream in the bag in about half an hour, all from the same spot. Two were 25cm, the third was 28cm. **And they were caught pretty close to the indicated Best feeding time.**

Maybe there <u>is</u> something to this Phases of the Moon stuff that Ross Williamson wrote about in last month's Newsletter?

(Chris Eldred will be pleased to hear I caught all 11 of my Bream that day on the 5' – 6'' Daiwa IM6 Graphite rod I bought from him for \$10 at the club Buy 'n Swap table. Thanks Chris! Great little rod!)

Footnote: No sign of a Summer Whiting on either trip, but back at the boat ramp a local gave me a 'confidential' tip which sounds worth trying. Apparently one can scoop "Jelly Prawns" out of the water from most of the pontoon jetties in the Nerang. You need a very fine mesh scoop, as these prawns are only about 2cm long. Kept alive with an aerator, they will allegedly attract Summer Whiting if you fish the bottom at anchor anywhere along the outside of the river bend from Little Tallebudgera Creek upstream a bit. Fish fairly close to shore. If anyone gives this a try, please let your Editor know how you get on, for a future Newsletter.

<u>Phases of the Moon as a predictor of best</u> fishing times – a proposed Club Project.

Have you spent some time on the SBSFC web site yet? If not, you ought to check it out as soon as you can spare a few minutes! It's good!

Ross Williamson has done a really great job of setting up a most useful and interesting site for us. There are eight active sections of the site at this stage, and one of them is called **Plan Your Fishing Trip**, and that section contains a link to the Fishing Calendar (**FishCal**) web site.

On that site you can trial FishCal for 21 days to see whether it is worth buying. To register as a licensed user of FishCal costs US\$25 (about A\$36), and you can pay by a secure credit card link. But check with Ross before you register. FishCal is worth checking out – it provides quite a lot of useful information, including Tide Times, Sunrise/Sunset for a chosen location, Phases of the Moon (of course) and Moonrise/ Moonset, etc.

Now the \$36 question is this: Is there any substance to the claimed relationship between the phases and positions of the moon and the propensity of fish to bite? Some of us have been buying the Angler's Almanac for years, and have found it to be less than infallible.

So here's another Ray Bricknell suggestion: How about we start a Club Project to check out the validity of the bite time claims made by FishCal and The Angler's Almanac?

All that individual members need to do is take note of the dates and times at which they fish, and pass this information to Club Secretary Ross Williamson, along with a summary of the catch (if any – nil returns are important here). Ross will then either keep a record of it on the Club Web Site, or else pass the info on to the Chairman of our Trips Sub-Committee, John Eldred. Either way, the info will be progressively consolidated into a format which will allow us to assess the relevance of the claimed Major (Best) and Minor feeding times for fish.

Interestingly, the dates and times indicated by FishCal do not precisely line up with The Angler's Almanac. As part of my research for this article I bought the 2006 Angler's Almanac and compared the two. This is what I found for Wednesday 8 March, on which date the Jetty Bream in the Nerang River responded **moderately well** to my Burley and Bait technique. Incidentally, The Angler's Almanac now costs \$4.95 per year (was \$3 for a long time – must have a new owner!).

Fish Cal: 'Fair' fishing day – Major feeding times 07:42am and 08:07pm; Minor times 01:54pm/01:29am.

Angler's Almanac: Poor' fishing day – Major feeding times 05:54am and 06:21pm; Minor times 11:54am / 12:21am. (Note the approx. two hour time differences between these two sources – they can't both be right. Maybe they are each measuring off a different moon? Something fishy here!)

I caught Bream around the 1pm to 2pm timeframe and did not fish either of the Major times that day, nor before 1pm, so I cannot say the Angler's Almanac times were wrong.

Then, for Thursday 16 March:

FishCal: Very Good' (not Best) fishing day – Major feeding times 01:10am and 01:35pm; Minor times 07:23am/07:48pm.

Angler's Almanac: Best' fishing day - Major feeding time 11:54am; Minor times 05:34am / 05:54pm.

The Bream were biting in the Nerang River system for the whole time I was there that day – from about 05:30am until about 2pm. So the indicated feeding times were somewhat irrelevant – but it sure as hell was a good day to fish.

Let's continue this research as a Club Project!

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT...

New Lifejacket Rules

It's now official; the laws affecting the wearing of life jackets in Queensland will change from the 1st of April. The new laws will require the master or owner of any commercial, fishing or recreational open boat under 4.8m, which is required to carry life jackets to ensure that:

- All children under 12 wear the specified life jacket or PFD for the area they are in whilst the vessel is under way.
- Everyone on board wears the specified life jacket or PFD for the area they are in when crossing bars.

An open boat is one that does not have a rigid cabin or an enclosed space that a person could occupy.

The recognised bars in Queensland are Currumbin Bar, Tallebudgera Bar, South Passage Bar, Maroochy Bar, Jumpinpin Bar, Caloundra Bar, Wide Bay Bar and Noosa Bar.

The owner or master of a vessel not complying with the new regulation will incur a Marine Infringement Notice and a minimum fine of \$150.

A full review of life jacket legislation by Maritime Safety Qld is to be undertaken after April 1st to identify other areas of the legislation which may need attention. Please forward your constructive thoughts to assist formation of a reply/response to this review.


John Cumberland has had large and small boat stickers printed, and these are available for sale at the every meeting. \$1 small; \$5 large.
