LAKE MONDURAN TRIP- 8th/ 15th NOVEMBER

Is Monduran stuffed?

Don't get me wrong. There are plenty of big Barra in Lake Monduran these days – huge, in fact. But as a club trip in November, I think Lake Monduran has had its day. Let me take you back a few years.

Our club used to travel to Lake Awoonga, near Gladstone, for our annual Barra trip in November. Then, in 2005, we discovered Lake Monduran (Fred Haigh Dam). An hour closer to Brisbane, it is in many ways an easier dam to fish than Awoonga.

The travel distances to the "prime" fishing spots are less, and there is less likelihood of having to risk your life crossing a broad expanse of very rough water coming home at night if the wind blows up.

In 2005 Monduran was a well-kept secret. The cabins and holiday houses were very affordable, and the caravan park was almost empty – even in November. Ditto, no crowding at the boat ramp. Not any more!

I couldn't believe my eyes, as I drove in this year. The caravan park was choc-a-block – literally. I actually heard the delightful Manageress, Kelly, tell someone they had been allocated the very last powered site in the park. And the holiday houses have about trebled in price since we first came here.

And you should see the boat ramps. There are three of them, and the biggest will accommodate about five or six boats being launched or recovered at once. Day and night whilst we were there, people had to park their boat trailers halfway up the (very steep) hill – even though the parking at the "main" launching site (useable only when the water level is up) has been expanded.

So what has happened to cause this sudden burst of popularity? Fishing Journos!

Pick up any fishing magazine these days, and there's Monduran. And it has been featured in TV fishing shows as well.

And the fishing Journos build up peoples' expectations unrealistically. "Metre plus Barra? Too easy at Monduran."

But the truth is, fishing is fishing. To catch fish you have to be in the right place, at the right time, with the right bait or lures. Get just one of these wrong – no fish.

This year we lucked right out.

There is a real chance the fish in Lake Monduran have become boat shy and lure shy. Presumably no fishery can stand this much fishing pressure day after day, week after week, without it having some impact on the fishing. There are competition weekends there also around this time of year.

In fairness, Dave Weston and John McAllan each caught a Barra around 55cm within an hour or so of their arrival on Friday morning, but after that – nothing. Three days later they were so disgusted they left a day earlier than planned and went home.

There was a huge downpour on the Saturday night – the heaviest rain I've experienced in years. Was that what put the fish off their tucker? Or was it the southerly buster? Who knows?

Whatever it was, it sure as hell sent the Barra into hiding. Not only could none of us catch a fish to save our lives – we weren't seeing any evidence whatsoever of Barra anywhere in the dam. At 35% full, there is plenty of water between the fish, but there was just no action at all. No flashes; no swirls; nothing other than a few Bony Bream breaking the surface occasionally.

Between us, we fished every nook and cranny from the backwater behind the boat ramp

the furthest extremities, where the fresh was trickling in from the downpour.

Fishing an average of about ten hours a day, with about ten of us on the water at any one time, the only fish we caught were occasional "flukes".

Neither did any of the other fifty plus fishers on the dam each day catch many. Three or four Barra skeletons each night was all we saw in the bin near the cleaning table – nothing, considering the number of fishers on the water every day. Fifty fishers is probably an underestimate.

Craig Milne did pick up a 92cm Barra on Saturday night – but there is a story to that fish. Craig was fishing with Paul Kirkland (Kiwi Paul), and they had put in a long hard day, as was the norm for this trip. They finished the day not far from the boat ramp, and Paul was trolling on the way back.



Craig was tired, and couldn't really be bothered putting a lure in the water. Paul nagged him into it. Half-heartedly, Craig started trolling, and not far from the boat ramp he got hit. Pure skill? Craig matched lure depth with the thermocline and the baitfish on the sounder and come up trumps. Alan Cushway and Ron Clarke arrived the next day – Sunday. They launched their boat about 3pm, and at 5:30pm Ron landed a 98cm Barra. What perseverance! Trolling, of course – pure skill! AND THAT WAS THE ONLY FISH CAUGHT THAT DAY.

By the way, to make those with expensive gear feel good, Ron was using a \$20 rod and a \$5 lure from Big W.

Then on Monday – NOTHING!

Tuesday was another long, hard day. Ray Bricknell, like everyone else, fished his heart out all day in some of the most promising "Barra bays" you are ever likely to see – without reward. (Tom Wallbank reckoned he could even SMELL Barramundi in some of those bays.)

Not a keen troller, Ray decided to troll his way back to the boat ramp – which was quite a long way away. He set off at 6pm.

At 6:15pm, barely out of Barra Bay, one of Ray's rods went off. Not much of a fight – he thought it was probably a Catfish. Turned out it was a 48cm Bass. Great skill went into catching it – like hell! It was just another fluke.

The poor bloody fish must have just grabbed the lure as it flashed past its nose in the fading light, and on doing so instantly went from stationary to 2.7 Knots, and got itself dragged along for about ten or twenty metres. The shock of the sudden acceleration probably stunned the Bass – it sure as hell didn't put up much of a fight. That fish was just out of luck.

So, from Friday morning to Tuesday night, with an average of ten fishers fishing ten hours a day for effectively four days, we had two small Barra, two decent Barra and one Bass – all caught by the "lure past the nose" (trolling) method. Hardly "Sport Fishing".

That's about 400 man-hours for five fish. This was an even worse catch rate than earlier trips to Monduran, where we logged one Barra for each 20 man hours of trolling, and one for each 10 man hours of lure casting.

The big difference this time was that lure casting had contributed NOTHING to the catch.

Ray left for home after another short and still unproductive session Wednesday morning. Your scribe will be interested to read the end result. The total trip will have involved about 90 man-days of fishing – that's about 900 manhours. Even at 1 per 20 there would need to have been 45 fish caught in the week to match the average.

The Trips Committee may need to consider possibly re-scheduling the Monduran trip to, say, March, and finding somewhere less crowded for the November Trip.

Many people left a day early as the fish were just not firing up. You could see them on the sounder if you were trolling the basin and the channels but they just did not attack the lures.

Many others were also fishing this "perfect" time and also having no success. Most people put in long days and spread their time between casting and trolling but had few touches or break-offs.

Word was that the dam was about a month behind this year so was acting like October in usual years but it was still touch and go. When people like Lloyd and Tom do not get a touch from days of casting you know it is tough.

Otherwise the fellowship and the companionship were all that we expect from this classic club trip. Sharing knowledge of what is working and where the fish are firing is all you expect. Ross Williamson picks up the story from here....

The other side was the very large number of boats attacking this dam. My best guess is that over 50 boats at this peak during the week and even with the rain and low water temperatures the number never dropped below 30 on any given day during the week. Parking at the "new" boat ramp below the cabins was at a premium.

I know on the Saturday when my brother, Ray Watson and myself were leaving, the camping area was packed and many dozens of boats were heading to the water. Like all fishermen, optimism rules and today is the day for the big one. Ian's and my tally for 7 solid days was one break-off after 3 minutes fight and one-10 second touch with one catfish captured trolling the basin. Others had similar experiences.

There was some discussion about moving the trip or changing to another dam but this can be left for another time.





The 2 peak periods for night tide fishing are approaching the Full and New Moon. These are often times where a species will gather in an area to prepare to, or to spawn.

Where to fish?

A common approach on Full Moons when it is very bright at night is to target deeper water.

Why?

The fish feel more secure in the deep water and will be less visible to predators wanting to feed on them and therefore less skittish.

Around New Moons, there's no moon visible in the sky at night and as a result it is much darker. The fish will feel more comfortable in moving into shallow areas.




NEW MEMBERS
