PEEL ISLAND / MORETON BAY 6^{TH} JUNE

This month's trips to Peel Island and Ballina had to be swapped due to the recent flooding of the Richmond River. The Peel Island trip was brought forward to the weekend of the 6th and 7th of June but the weather was not looking to good for Sunday with storms predicted. It was decided to head out from Redland bay early on Saturday morning.

Only six club members attended this trip to take advantage of the perfect bay conditions. Trip captain John Cumberland and Neil McNeil. Bob Hartley fished with Nakia Melody, Kevin Ford and Myself.



Everyone was up early hoping to land a good size Snapper. I was the only one not to launch from the Redland boat harbour. I launched from Point Talburpin and fished the southern end of Macleay Island in the canoe.

JC and Neil caught a few undersize Snapper early in the morning around Potts point casting soft plastic around the reef. And Neil caught another small Snapper drifting in the channel later n in the morning. They also fished beside Kevin Ford for a while. Kevin is going through a squid thing at the moment but even Kevin could not jig up a squid on the day.



Bob and Nakia had a similar story although they had managed to get on to some small cod. Nakia later identified them as juvenile Maori cod. Thanks to Nakia for sending through the sunrise pictures in this report. I fished at the southern end of Macleay Island. It's about a 20 minute run from where I launched. My canoe is well equipped with nav lights, but I still have to be careful and keep a lookout for boats before dawn. Lucky the only traffic is usually the occasional water taxi.

I was drifting soft plastics all morning with only some small picks. I was using one rod rigged with a snapback and another other heavier rod rigged with a bozo Kruncha lure. Usually the snapper will come on the bight around the top of the tide but the water was still very dirty from the recent rains and by about 10.00am I felt that it better target a different species of fish if I was going to salvage the trip.

I rigged an ecogear SX60F onto a bait caster rig and was now targeting Large Bream or Flathead around the sandy island shores.

It was not long before I had a hook up. It was surprising because it was only a slight hit. I thought a small bream attacked the lure but as I retrieved line a nice size flathead was seen on the surface. Flat head are funny fish, this one hardly put up a fight when hooked but this soon changed when it got into the net. It shook and jumped out of the net onto the canoes floor. What made it harder was it had swallowed the lure down to the gills, making it difficult to recover my expensive SX60. Finally the Flattie was on ice in the esky.



Time to head for home. The Redland family fishing classic was also on over the long weekend and most people struggled to catch any deceit fish. The thing to remember with bay fishing it you have to plan for your best weather and if we had left the trip on the Sunday we would have been caught in a squally Sunday morning storm. So thanks go to JC for planning a perfect Moreton bay trip.

BALLINA TRIP 19TH, 20TH & 21ST JUNE

Well, it seems that our fishing club should offer a new service to the people of Australia. We should be drought breakers! I think that if we went for a trip in the Nullarbor Desert we would still get flooded out. Ballina was no exception. This trip was scheduled for the start of the month but was postponed due to flooding of the Richmond River. Over the week the North Coast received a lot of rain. Although the river did not rise, it was still murky. The wind was blowing and squally showers made fishing conditions challenging.

Eight members fished this trip. John Eldred, Glen Kennedy, John Cumberland, Neil McNeil, Geoff Dailey, Eddie Latz, Bob Hartley and Myself.

On Saturday JC and Neil McNeil found it so hard that they were forced into using yabbies for bait. This worked, as Yabbies are great bait, and a few bream and Flathead were caught.

Glen was fishing from his Hobie kayak on Saturday morning; kayak fishing was too uncomfortable so glen accompanied John Eldred in the afternoon. A boat is a fair bit drier in the squally conditions. Glen caught one Bream on lure.



Bob Hartley went out on Saturday morning with no luck and ended up leaving for home in the afternoon.

Geoffrey and Eddie were land based, fishing from the wall. Eddie Caught an Eel tail catfish and a Forktail Catfish. Geoff caught one undersize bream and a decent 45cm Flathead.



I arrived about 5.00pm and had just enough time to get my gear in the cabin and then it was down to the camp kitchen for a BBQ.

Our local Ballina club members Tom Wallbank and Dianne Brown met us all at the BBQ. The tall stories flowed all night and JC kept the grey nomads occupied most of that time.

Sunday and most of the members were sick of the wind and the rain. They found that it was much drier in the cabin. Only three members ventured out. JC, Neil and Myself.

Although I was casting all morning I only had one Bream strike on a jackall chubby. JC and Neil were starting to catch a few decent bream in the protected area behind the porpoise wall. These bream were caught trolling lures, with the larges coming in at 31cm.

My casting arm was getting sore so I too started trolling and it was not long before I caught my first and only bream. It must have been hungry because it nailed a 60mm lure, an Ecogear SX60F.



That about wraps up the weekend. Thank goes to John Eldred for stepping in as trip captain and organizing the accommodation.



BLADES

There is no doubt one of the latest crazes in Lure fishing is the emergence of metal blade style lures. Blades have been a progression from small vibration baits and lipless crank baits like the Jackalls.

Blades also offer a crossover between fishing deeper water with soft plastic and shallow water with a hard body lure.

Usually described as Vibration baits, Blades as they are generally known, are a thin metal profile lure weighted and shaped at the head end. The profile is of a small baitfish, a wide variety of colours and features like 3D eyes and quality hooks. A wide variety of finishes exist as well, with metallic flashy colours and matt finishes being used across brands to appeal to the angler.

With the ability to be fished many ways, Blades can be very effective in a slow roll presentation, vertically jigged, trolled or hopped along the bottom. Fish them as you would a Spinnerbait, a soft plastic, a jig or any hard body lure. The common luring techniques are still used.

Blades usually have a single tow point or a series of tow points along the top. The advantage of the multiple tow points allows for different actions from the lure by moving the tow point forward or back on the lure.

The front point gives maximum action when vertically jigged or in deep water.

The middle point is used when a medium or fast retrieve is being used in shallower water or down banks.

The rear point gives maximum action on a slower retrieve.

Generally fitted with 2x trebles or double hooks, with one hook on the rear and the other on the underside of the belly. Which hook option is best, is up for debate. Double hooks by design offer a little better snag resistance by having the hook points facing up so they are less likely to snag on the bottom. Trebles should offer a better hook-up rate.

Blade sizes also vary from around 30mm and up, with larger sizes coming onto the market often.

A 30mm blade is usually around 1/8 oz or 3.5 grams with the weight generally increasing as the length increases; this is to allow for swimming action on the drop and also the ability to stay in touch with the lure when targeting fish in faster moving or deeper water.

Varieties of sizes are now on the market and as the popularity continues to grow the number of variations in materials and size and weights are likely to continue.

Prices start from around \$10.00 and up.


NEW MEMBERS
