JUMPINPIN TRIP REPORT - 20" MAY "ONE OF THOSE DAYS"

Eight members attended, Geoff Daley fished with Eddy Latz, Jeff Maddalena with Mark Veivers, while Glen Kennedy deckied for Kevin Ford and myself for Lloyd Willmann.

The day could not have started better; the weather really turned it on for us. It was a glorious autumn morning as we launched Lloyd's boat at 5am. Just the slightest westerly breeze, not strong enough to disturb the glass like surface of the water. With reports of the odd Jew to 12 kg being caught at the Pin recently, there are no prizes for guessing where we headed. As first light appeared over the horizon

we had started our first drift in front of Swan Bay. The deep channel that runs through here has several nasty snags that the Mulloway use to ambush their prey. The lure is constantly momentarily catching on snags as you lift the jog off the bottom. I have found that it is at this moment that the fish will hit the plastic, just as you lift. The old heart is constantly given a boost as the jig bumps across the snaggy bottom.

I started the day well by leaving my 8 kg rod at home. Things didn't get much better, as only 20 mins had passed and I had lost my first rig to a snag. 10 mins later I was occupied for the next hour sorting out a birds nest. When I did start fishing again I lost another two rigs in 20 mins. I couldn't be accused of not putting the wire amongst structure; it's just that I couldn't get it out again. Whether Lloyd felt sorry for me or just got sick of pulling me off the bottom, he suggested we try for a flathead along Kalinga Bank. We didn't do any good there either but at least my jig supply was remaining stable. We moved onto the southern bank of Short Island where we had our only excitement for the morning. Lloyd locked up solid for about 30 seconds before whatever it was spat it. We tried the weed beds between Kangaroo and Eden Island and then onto the cod hole at Kangaroo Island for the last try. Nothing and nothing.



The other crews fared a little better. Kevin and Glen landed five Flathead, (35cm, 38cm, 38cm, 39cm & 40cm) only one just legal, and a few Legal Bream and a 27.5cm Snapper. Eddy and Geoff caught four nice Bream

BCL easyPDF Printer Driver 38 cm. They said they threw others back, two of which went 24 and 27 cm. Mark and Jeff caught small Bream and an assortment of other things. Mark did land the fish of the trip, a quality Tarwhine caught on a yabby. We had great weather and conditions, but as pointed out by Lloyd, that rarely coincides with great fishing. I tend to agree.

We assembled for a BBQ lunch at the new coin operated facilities installed at Meridien Horizon Shores Marina, but like everything else around there, it loves taking your money but gives nothing back in return (it wasn't working). Alternative arrangements were made to cook our BBQ and after a delay we eventually had lunch. Having a chat and a laugh about the day's events over lunch with fellow fishers is an enjoyable way to end the day.

CARP FISHING IN THE DANUBE

Hi Guys – Please don't think I'm bragging, because I'm not. I have just come across something that I thought might interest you.

Helen and I have been visiting our son who lives in London and, having come all this way, we're doing a coach tour of Central Europe. We are starting the tour in Vienna.

This morning I took a walk across the Danube River, and I came across this scene. Hope you can see how the two rods are set up.



I presume this "all night" fisher was chasing Carp. I tried to describe the way they fish for Carp in Europe at a club meeting some time back. They are very careful not to let the fish see them. The carp tend to feed along the bank — I hid in a Willow tree and watched for a while, and I saw a couple about 300 mm long in close to the bank — surprisingly (to me) they appeared to be chasing smaller fish. I could not be sure what they were chasing. Maybe the fish I saw were not Carp?

At any rate, it struck me as amusing that someone should fish all night for what I presumed was Carp, so I thought I would share it with you. Incidentally, it is currently not getting dark here until at least 9pm, and it is light again at 4am.

FINAL REPORT – FLATHEAD SURVIVAL

More than 90% of Flathead caught and released by recreational anglers will survive if a few simple precautions are taken, says principal investigator Jeremy Lyle of the Tasmanian Aquaculture & Fisheries Institute.

His controlled experiments with Sandy and Dusky Flathead and further information from volunteer fishers showed:

- Baited circle hooks and unbaited lures produced the best results because they were seldom swallowed
- Circle hooks were also shown to match the catch rates of J-hooks
- With J-hooks, keeping the line tight minimised deep hooking
- Survival of deep hooked fish was maximised by cutting the line and leaving the hook in place.

Flathead is Australia's principal recreational saltwater species and is second only to Bream in numbers caught and released.


