PIMPAMA RIVER TRIP – 20/01/08

The trip was well attended by 13 members and 2 guests, Jeff Maddalena (Editor), John Cumberland (Tagging Officer), Ross Williamson (Secretary), Garth Dale & Partner, Bryan Williamson, Mark Veivers, Glen Kennedy, Andrew Cumberland, Kevin & Rachel Ford, Bob Hartley, 2 guests that J.C gave the trip information to, and myself (Trip Captain & Trip Coordinator). With most people catching fish and everybody seeming to enjoy themselves, the odd shower that was just enough to put a damper on things sadly hampered the day.



Most people were on the water by 6.30am with the majority launching at the Diamond Head boat ramp and working their way up the river with the incoming tide. Jeff Maddalena & Myself both launched from the Kirkin Road weir and worked our way down stream. Heading off from the weir the 1st person I saw was Jeff who spent quite a bit of time casting at the snags and also the underlying mangroves but I believe from past experience that the tide was a little high for this method to produce good results in this area. After a quick chat I headed off towards what the locals refer to as the “mouth” which, in fact, is where the river first starts to open out onto the flats adjacent to the “Calypso Bay” estate. Off to my right I could see a white boat and upon getting closer saw that it was J.C & Andrew. They had stopped to check their crab pots and had already caught a couple of flathead on the

troll across the flat area between the boat ramp and the “Calypso Bay” estate. After the pots had been reset we both headed off in the same direction, down stream to the flats area.



At this point I started throwing “frangers” (soft plastics) around in the shallows for flatties but I wasn’t having a lot of luck. It was only a short time later and Kevin and Rachel were heading towards me to say giddyay, we were soon joined by Glen who arrived in a rather “stealthily” manner, after the normal chin wag and some directions given out as to how to get upstream, another boat arrived and it was Garth Dale & his partner. It was great to see Garth back on a club trip and enjoying his new boat at the same time.



I decided after a short while that a move was in order so I headed further down stream towards the “stockyards”. It was great to see Bob Hartley out joining us for his 1st club trip. (I hope that you

enjoyed yourself Bob) We just had a passing chat and said that we would catch up at the morning tea break.

I started drifting across from the stockyards and quite quickly picked up 2 flatties, one was 35cm and one 38cm. Both were caught on 3" grubs. It was not long after this I saw Ross in the distance paddling away but disappeared before our morning tea. I started to head towards the stockyards and saw Mark on the way when I was approached by the fisheries patrol. After a short chat with them (with J.C joining in) the writer started on to them about jet skiers. I was told that as we are drifting and not at anchor the jet skiers do not have to stay 60 metres from us. After some swift talking the patrol was off at full throttle, lights ablaze, to have a stern talk to a group of jet skiers that failed to recognise one small rule. Jet Ski's are only allowed in a navigable channel. As this bunch was about 1km past the last channel marker they had broken the law.



We then all stopped at the only small piece of land we could find; as the tide was so high the beach had disappeared. It was shortly after this we were shown what coming prepared really means. Jeff was heading towards us, umbrella up to stop the light shower dampening his enthusiasm and upon arriving got out a portable gas cooker, fry pan and some snags. He cooked them up on the front of Marks boat and had even bought tomato sauce with him as well.

After about a ½ hr break we all headed off. I fished for about another ½ hour and then

headed for home passing some of the members on the way. It was an enjoyable morning out and I would like to thank all of those who participated in the excursion and I am hopeful that this being the 1st trip for the year has now set precedence as to the numbers that will attend the club outings. I also think that the morning get together was a success and other trip captains should perhaps look at doing the same if the location allows for such a catch up.

A FUNNY DAM STORY

One of the “joys” of living on acreage is that you need to catch and save your own water. About a year ago we had a large farm dam dug on our place.

It was difficult to position it (even for a retired Civil Engineer), because on the high side there was not much catchment area, and on the low (river) side there was the risk of it occasionally being over-topped by floodwaters. And the river is salt – not great for garden watering.

I compromised, and built it with the top of the walls and spillway just above the seven-year flood line. I asked the dozer operator to build it as large as the surrounding contours would permit, in the full knowledge that it would probably never fill. Filled to overflowing, it will hold close to 4 Mega litres.

Thankfully, the recent rain has ALMOST filled it – about another metre to go before it overtops the spillway. So we are still trying to direct every drop into it.

To this end I have run an overflow pipe about 225mm diameter from our small (ornamental) dam through the hill to discharge above the big dam. We checked it just after the small dam filled a couple of days ago, and it was running just fine. This morning, however, it was not flowing at all.

A couple of hours later, wet and filthy and covered in Cobblers Pegs, Helen and I managed to clear that pipe (it took us ages to find the heavily overgrown discharge end of it).

Helen was standing at the end of the pipe whilst I was trying to force a 25mm hose past an obstruction, which we reckoned, had to be pretty close to the outlet. **Then I heard her scream!**

When I got close enough to talk to her, she told me the "obstruction" had just come out the end of the pipe. It was an Eel about two feet long. It had apparently got to the end and found its way blocked by some grass and weeds that had grown up into the pipe.

So the new dam already has its first Eel in it, as the Eel would certainly have followed the water flow through the grass to its new home.

Ah well, that's life in the country for you.

Tech Tips- Lure Colours

With so many colours, how do you know where to start?

Here are a few pointers to get you headed in the right direction when trying to choose what lure colour stands the best chance to catch you a fish. If you are into your Lure fishing you have probably heard, "The lure catches the fish, the colour catches the fisherman"

This is probably largely true. For those new to the sport there are a few basic rules, which can help you until you have your favourite lure colours locked away and settled on.

Low light conditions= Dark lures. The theory here is based on the lure silhouette. A dark lure will stand out more against the background in low light, i.e. early morning or late afternoon and even cloudy/overcast days.

Bright Light= Light Lures. In bright sunlight light coloured or natural colours lures are a good place to start. The fish will get a good look at the lure and anything that doesn't look natural will stand out more.

Clear Water or Shallow Water= Light Lures, the fish will get a good look at your lure and leaders etc. If it looks real you may stand a better chance to attract the bite.

Dirty/Murky Water or Deep Water= Bright Lures, Just helps the fish find your lure when they are relying on vibration and smell senses to detect if there is something within range, just helps them find it.

This should give you a good starting point when trying to attract a reaction from the fish, and also what to do if the bite changes because conditions have changed during your fishing session.


