A Whale of a Time at Hervey Bay

Kevin Ford and family, Wife Carole Ann and Daughter Rachel, took sointentiwe would be pulling the tail towards us, and it would to simply head away again. Catching any fish by the tail greater

visit Hervey Bay on the first weekend of the School Holidays.

Kevin had arranged a trip with local fishing Guide Paul Dolan of Fraser Coast Sportfish on the Saturday, and the plan was also for some Whale Watching as a family trip on the Sunday.

Saturday started early with a 5.30am pick up. Launched at the boat ramp at Urangan and headed around Big Woody Island.

We spotted some Mack Tuna feeding, but they were very spread out. We followed them for a while, but they sounded quickly and we didn't really get a cast at them as they stayed very spread out whenever they broke the surface.

We fished a few tide lines initially, and Paul (the Guide) gave me the rundown on the technique he used. This was quite a physical technique, but similar to some jigging we did in the Maroochy River a few years back when chasing Trevally.

About 30 mins of jigging and we had a solid hook-up. The fish took about 100 metres of line on the initial run, and we took off in pursuit to try to get some line back. We tightened the drag up a bit and the second run was a bit shorter than the first, maybe 50 metres, but it still had the drag smoking. Paul had called it for a big Mackerel and we discussed ways of getting it to the boat.

We followed this thing around for about 35 minutes before we got it up and saw it was a big Longtail Tuna. Once it tired a bit we had it doing circles which consisted of surfacing away from the boat, diving deep as it approached the boat, and continuing to circle. Each time it did this we got a twang

through the line as the leader must have been flicking off its pectoral fins. This was really unsettling, as the rod was fully loaded all the time and every twang sounded like a broken line

After another five minutes of chasing this thing across sandflats and into deepwater again we got it up and noticed it had tail wrapped the leader. This is something which happens quite regularly with Long Tail Tuna.

Each time we tried to drive towards it, it would head away from the boat. When we put more pressure on it to try and get more time would be pulling the tail towards us, and it would simply head away again. Catching any fish by the tail greatly increases the fight! (Ed: As with Tigers!)

We discussed a few different tactics of tailing it, etc. As we lined up to do it, the leader popped as a result of chaffing. Damn!! We had wasted about 45 minutes for no result, but it was a lot of fun.

We headed back to try again, but we found it pretty slow, so we moved to a few different spots. Picked up a Diamond Trevally, a Tea Leaf Trevally and 2x Bludger Trevally at different locations.

Paul decided we would head off to see if we could raise a Queenfish. We headed to Little Woody Island. Paul cast a hookless Popper to try and stir the fish, and I cast a Snapback Soft Plastic in behind to see if they were interested. Twenty minutes and no activity, so we decided to head back to our starting point and try rolling some Shads across the bottom.

We boated 2x flathead, 62cm and 60cm, in pretty short time on a Gold Shad. The 62cm fish was bulging with roe. Both were released.

Back into jigging for Golden Trevally - had a few bumps and flashes, which was promising. Then, after about another 30 minutes, a bump was followed by a hook-up. Similar feel to the Long Tails, but the initial run wasn't as long. After a short chase and about 15 minutes and we had a Golden Trevally to the boat. Paul tagged it. This is something he has been doing for a while, but he hasn't had a re-capture on any of the fish he has tagged to date. This fish measured 92cm to the tips of the tail.

All in all a top day, catching a variety of species, and with a couple of memorable hook ups.

Sunday saw a strong northerly change come through in the early hours of the morning.

Pick up for the whale watching was 8.00am. (You beauty – a sleep in.) A northerly in Hervey Bay is very choppy and, we soon learnt, not pretty. Good thing we had a tablet with breakfast just in case. The girl who was running around with the sea-sick bags was having a busy day!

The boat we were on traveled just past Moon Point before sighting the first whale blows, and a few small pods. The humpbacks were very active, and were breaching about 50 metres away for the boat. They seem to enjoy the swell and were breaching into it a lot. After moving from pod to pod we continued to head north following a few bigger whales, and they soon became very interested in the boat. I guess we had them circling and surfacing and swimming under the charter boat for about one and a half hours. It was amazing to see these whales so close to the boat – we are talking about 1-2 metres away!

When the time came to leave the Skipper had to wait until both the whales were out in front of the boat, and then reverse away from them. The whales actually chased the boat for a short time until we could get turned around and driving away from them.

We were all surprised to see so many whales, and to see them so close up. It was truly a memorable day for all the right reasons.

We can highly recommend Paul Dolan's guiding services, and Tasmin Venture Whale watching charters as a top time.


John Cumberland is also getting large and small boat stickers printed, and hopefully these will be available for sale at the September meeting.
