Trip Reports

Rainbow Beach/Tin Can Bay Trip by John Eldred

Our club trip to Rainbow Beach was as usual full of fun but not so full of fish. The house was great and the weather for the first few days was good. Sunday we were all out trolling and casting all over the place for no fish but we did have a good look around. There were lots of small bust-ups of Tailor around the Big Mick Beacon and several schools of bait showing on the sounder but no matter what I threw at them, they wouldn't play. Ross and Ian had engine issues from the get go which persisted for the whole week but soldiered on anyway. On the Monday I chased a feed of winter whiting and kept a dozen around 23-24cm but little else. Tuesday, the wind got up so Bob, Neil and yours truly took my Hilux for a spin up the beach to Double Island Point for a surf fish. We pumped some yabbies and caught a couple of whiting but none of any real size. It was still a bit early for them up there. Wednesday, Bob and Neil found a school of Moses Perch up one of the creeks and proceeded to catch and release dozens of them. Bob also caught a brightly coloured Wrasse which he photographed for later identification. The weather started to get a bit wet for the rest of the week that but the wind did drop but not by much. A few legal Flathead started to turn up towards the end of the week. Bob got one legal tailor and a 62cm Flathead to be the best performed member on the trip. All in all a good social trip as usual but no real catches of fish. (sound familiar) The best social event of the trip was our Western Australian member having a birthday. The cake, \$10.00, the candles, \$1.50, the look on his face, absolutely priceless. Ross isn't able to apply for his seniors card quite yet, but he's getting closer. Sorry Ross. The trip home was not a lot of fun with heavy showers and rain all the way but on the up side, none of the boats or my Hilux needed much of a wash down when we got home.



Albert River Tagging Trip Saturday 30th

Again, our annual Bass tagging trip to start off the Bass season on the tidal fresh section of the Albert River. Six members attended, with the Alan Wilkie Bridge the launch place. In previous years, we fished the upstream section, but reports had shown fish downstream as well. Kev, Neil and myself went downriver. Eddy and Chris went up, followed by

Lloyd, who thought Eddy might get lonely. Rumours had it, Ray was going come up in his

boat from the Paterson Rd ramp, if the low tide permitted. The first fish fell to Kev, a perfectly presented fly, cast to a trash line under a bottlebrush. His first Bass on fly, 27cm, very hard to land, using a 9 foot rod out of a kayak the same length. The tide was still falling with the low at 8am. We dragged over a couple of gravel bars, to where a small island split the river. The smaller side channel had some structure against the bank with the water rushing through it. Neil and Kev fished it from the bank. Neil donating a Jackall Chubby to a good fish, before nailing another about 27cm.

A boat then appeared downriver, cautiously making it way up, with that familiar orange hat on the head of the skipper. Ray had bumped and ground his way up to us, trolling up a 35cm Bass on the way. The gravel bars stopped any further progress up, and the falling tide precluded him returning until it turned. Leaving him to contemplate his movements, we kept working our way down. The river banks slowly changed, more mud on the banks, plus thongs, buckets, burger wrapping, tyres, all the leavings of the throwaway modern age.

disgusting really. We fished all the way down to Willman's Island with the only fish seen was a Tilapia still in it's death throes after a Bull Shark had neatly severed it behind the dorsal.

The tide just turned as we got past the island, so Ray could make his way back. Neil caught another fish on the way back, and that was all the action over. We all arrived back at the causeway pretty well together. The



upstream crew had only managed about the same number. All up, a lot less than last year. We had a cook up at the car park, compared notes and it was all over till next year.
